This original ledger, showing the company's balance sheet figures dating back to 1923, illustrates - in longhand - how much detail companies had to have in their financial statements, even back then.

The balance sheet shows an agreed overdraft limit of £5000 to pay for timber bought in for construction of the blinds.

A note has been added to the ledger, to say the Manager had made a promise to pay back the Bank "as soon as possible". Evidence to prove or dis-prove whether he made good on his promise, has yet to be discovered.

New product design was very important to companies back at the beginning of the 20th Century. Detailed design drawings had to be supplied to the Patent Office, to guard against competitors copying designs. Robertshaws patented a number of designs over the years, including its famous "Spring Roller"



Bureaucracy was still an issue back then. Most of our forms today tend to be computer-based. Back then, companies spent hours filling in forms and logging them with various official bodies - each of whom expressed their own interest in how commercial blinds should impact upon the neighbours, the locality & the business environment in general.
